2024 Annual Report  
To ICSA Board of Directors**

The initial email call for nominations was emailed March 1, 2024, to all ICSA email lists with a deadline for nominations of April 15. On April 1, a deadline reminder message was sent to all ICSA email lists. On April 13, a last call email was sent. Nominations were closed April 15, 2024.

The following members of the Hall of Fame Committee were confirmed by May 1: NEISA-Ken Legler; MAISA-Adam Werblow; PCCSC-Robert Capita; SEISA-Karl Kleinschrodt; MCSA-Gail Turluck; and SAISA-David Herbster.

Once the nominations were collected, they were assembled by category and provided to the Committee members with the Award description by category. The Committee members were given eleven days to consider and send their selections. The Committee had a conference call on May 2, 2024 where the procedures for selection consideration and the goals of having a conference call were discussed and agreed to. Five Conferences had active participation in the selection process. Due to illness, NEISA's representative was unable to participate. The MCSA representative recused herself from voting on the Outstanding Service-Volunteer.

The Committee agreed to doing a better job of taking an active role, promoting and gathering nominations within their Conferences going forward.

We had one nominee for Student Leadership (James Rousmaniere Award), one nominee for Lifetime Service (Campbell Family Award), zero nominees for Outstanding Service by a College Sailing Professional (Graham Hall Award), one nominee for Outstanding Service-Volunteer, and one nominee for Meritorious Service.

The Association members are reminded that individuals may be renominated.

Notably, the Awardee for Outstanding Service-Volunteer is the first Coach and Conference Commissioner to be named as a Volunteer; all other Coaches have been compensated.

With the ongoing reduction in nominations for all awards, the Committee considered and approved the following schedule change for the process for 2025 and beyond:

Open nominations January 15  
Reminder #1 February 15  
Reminder #2 February 26  
Close nominations March 1

It is rare a freshman would achieve recognition. This timing permits conferences to have their Annual Meeting awardees nominated on a timely basis. This also times well with down time for collegians who are dealing with championships and exams in the current timeframe. It is the committee's sincere desire to have many people nominated annually as we are confident many are performing work to support this amazing sport and recognizing their efforts is exemplary.

I thank the nominators and the members of the Committee for their attentive and thoughtful consideration, discovery, and contributions. The Committee is pleased to name the individuals on the following pages as the 2024 inductees to the Inter-Collegiate Sailing Association of North America Hall of Fame.

Two years ago, winning regattas, competing in an ICSA National Championship, practicing four times a week and hosting MCSA's Midwinters Conference would have been completely out of the question for University of Chicago's sailing team. At that time, we were just coming out of a two-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Previous sailing team leadership was long gone, and the team had all but disappeared entirely. The team website hadn't been updated in five years, team drysuits, pinnies, and sails had allegedly gone missing, and there was nowhere for the team to practice.

Enter Natalie Manley, a passionate sailor and leader, whose dream coming to University of Chicago was to bring its sailing team back to life. In the two years she has served on the executive board of the team (first as Practice Coordinator, then as Team Captain), Natalie has done just that. It was Natalie who rebuilt the team's relationship with Jackson Park Yacht Club, Chicago, Illinois, and negotiated a practice, boat storage and facility usage contract with them.

It was Natalie who restructured the team executive board to include a recruitment/social chair and who led the team in recruiting 30+ new members this year. It was Natalie who brought the team's boats back into working condition after they sat outside in the elements for 2 years straight.

It was Natalie who located our team's lost drysuits and purchased new ones for members to share for years to come. It was Natalie who created a University of Chicago sailing email and calendar and it was Natalie who suggested promoting the team from Fundamental to Regional status.

It is Natalie who has worked with extremely limited team funds this year after our previous captains failed to apply for school funds the year before.

It is Natalie who coaches sailing practice four times per week and it is Natalie who organized this year's MCSA Midwinters Conference.

Natalie is quite literally the glue that holds the University of Chicago sailing team together. Not only did she help bring the team back from the brink of death, but she now keeps it running like a well oiled machine. Natalie puts in countless hours of work each week, from making practice pairings, to transporting members to and from practice, to coordinating regatta logistics and hosting social events. She makes every effort to make sailing as fun and accessible for people, while also pushing the team to be competitive and perform well at regattas.

While we are sad that she will be leaving us at the end of this year, we are confident that thanks to the infrastructure she has helped put in place, University of Chicago sailing will continue to grow and thrive for years to come.

Gail McCarthy Turluck has dedicated countless hours over multiple decades to promoting and strengthening collegiate sailing. Her involvement with the MCSA and ICSA is truly impressive.

She served as the MCSA Graduate Secretary and on the ICSA Board of Directors from 1998-2003 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2003 for Outstanding Service. As Tell Tale Editor from 1978 to 1984 and Publications Coordinator for the MCSA from 1991-2003, she edited our newsletter The Tell Tale six times per year. Gail has organized major sailing clinics and championships, including chairing the 1996 ICSA National Afterguard Championship and 2003 ICSA National Afterguard Championship. She has served on this committee since 2008 as well as many other ICSA and MCSA committees and roles including: MCSA Afterguard Advisory Committee Representative, ICSA Afterguard Chair, Acting ICSA Afterguard Events Coordinator.

She visited the 2013 Intercollegiate Offshore Regatta at Larchmont Yacht Club. So enthused by the experience, she brought the concept to Lake Michigan which led to the establishment of the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Offshore Regatta and later the Lake Erie Intercollegiate Offshore Regatta.

She has coached Western Michigan Sailing Team from time to time and will resume that role Fall 2024.

Her passion for developing college sailors is evident through her roles coaching, leading training programs, and coordinating events over the years. Gail's lifetime of volunteer work has hugely impacted and advanced collegiate sailing.

It is my great pleasure to nominate Dana Magliola for College Sailing's Hall of Fame in the category Outstanding Service – Volunteer. I first met Dana in the Fall of 2013, when I had taken over trying to build Jacksonville University's sailing team and Dana had just begun helping with the North Carolina State program.

Since then, Dana has established himself as a college coach, and he has assumed the role of SAISA Commissioner.

In light of the fact that he is both coach and commissioner as a volunteer, I would describe Dana's volunteer service to college sailing as above and beyond.

I don't know how he does it. To have a family, two young kids, a full time job and coach as well as lead SAISA as commissioner--most people would struggle to do what he does full time. But he does it as a volunteer and at the highest level.

Dana's results speak for themselves as far as his team and the conference go. His team has gone from being a small club team with low commitment at the bottom of the SAISA rankings, to a conference champion competing at the national championship. In my estimation, that of itself is a lot of success as a volunteer.

But on top of that is Dana's work as SAISA Commissioner. Our membership has grown from about 20 teams to over 30. SAISA's competitiveness has grown in leaps and bounds and we have more teams than ever vying to compete at Nationals. It's important to remember that he has been a champion of club teams, both in SAISA and nationally.

When Dana was elected commissioner, I volunteered to be his VP as support since he was a volunteer coach. I thought he'd need the help, but he has far exceeded expectations as both coach and commissioner – and he has done it as a volunteer.

Dana is exactly what college sailing has needed as a commissioner, championing smaller club teams in an ever more competitive professional environment. He is never afraid to rock the college sailing boat and passionately strive for more.

I am honored to call him a friend and it is a privilege to be able to nominate him for the Hall of Fame.

George Griswold was first elected to the College Sailing Hall of Fame in 1973 for his efforts for the Midwest Collegiate Sailing Association as its Graduate Secretary-Treasurer and representation to the Inter-Collegiate Sailing Association Board of Directors. He also was serving as Editor/Publisher of The Tell Tale, printed newsletter of the Midwest Collegiate Sailing Association.

### Campbell Family Award for Lifetime Service

George Griswold achieved recognition with the College Sailing award for Lifetime Service as a member of the award establishing group in 2000. Due to his health he had stepped down from serving as Midwest Collegiate Sailing Association Graduate Secretary-Treasurer, yet maintained service to the Procedural Rules and Eligibility Committees of the Inter-Collegiate Sailing Association.

### Meritorious Service

George Griswold has continued his untiring service to the sport of College Sailing. He remained on the Procedural Rules Committee through the period during which the Collegiate Dinghy Class Rules were developed, implemented and improved, serving as Committee Chair.

He remains on the Eligibility Committee of the Inter-Collegiate Sailing Association, serving as Chair.

In 2012 his work to establish the Midwest Collegiate Sailing Association Foundation resulted in recognition by the US International Revenue Service for the foundation as a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. The MCSA Foundation's purpose is to provide charitable, scientific, or educational support for the MCSA and its member schools. The MCSA Foundation's mission is to promote area, national, and international sailing, maritime education, and amateur sailing competition in the Midwest including the support of outreach programs, training activities, the provision of sailing equipment and encouragement of nautical activities by the MCSA and its Member Schools. He served as Chair of the Foundation Board of Directors until this year.

He sits in frequently on Board Meetings of the Midwest Collegiate Sailing Association, providing sound recommendations.

During this period he scanned all past issues of the printed The Tell Tale newsletter; it takes 3 disks to hold them all.

Quietly, he is a member of the Michigan Sailing Club, the community arm of the University of Michigan Sailing Club.

He has served as PRO and Judge for countless collegiate and other regattas all over the Midwest during this period and more.

The Inter-Collegiate Sailing Association has benefited in immeasurable ways through his consistent, fair, even-tempered hand.

It is proposed the Meritorious Service award be granted to George H. Griswold.
